[The changing dynamics of sport: ISSA @ 60](#)

The theme of the 60th anniversary of the International Sport Sociology Association (ISSA) World Congress was '60 Years of the Sociology of Sport: Past, Present, and Future Trajectories.' The conference took place at Seoul National University (SNU), South Korea, from July 8-11, 2025.

It drew 400 participants from 44 countries, including Trinidad & Tobago, and featured 300 papers. The Korean Society for Sport Sociology (KSSS), celebrating its 35th anniversary, led

the Local Organising Committee (LOC) to ensure the event's success. Dominic Malcolm, Professor of Sociology of Sport at Loughborough University in London, UK, delivered the keynote address titled 'The Sociology of Sport: From Positivist to Post-truth Science.' His speech discussed three main issues in the development of the ISSA over its 60-year history. He traced the origins of the sociology of sport back to the 1960s within mainstream sociology, emphasising its strong social scientific orthodoxy, which was based on positivism and a quantitative methodological approach. While this approach was significant, it marginalised interpretivist meanings, which have proven to be very valuable in understanding the intersectionality of marginalised groups. Reflecting on the 60 years since the birth of the sociology of sport, he argued that some goals set by the founders have been achieved, such as 'organisational and literary development and its impact on sociology and society.' He noted that the discipline's growth has embraced a broader interdisciplinary approach, leading to increased 'social activism and public sociology,' as well as redefining sport to include 'exercise, activity, and physical culture.'

His final concern centred on how modern sociology of sport operates in an increasingly post-truth environment. Post-truth refers to a situation where emotional appeals and personal beliefs often overshadow factual evidence. It has become a dominant force in 21st-century politics and is reflected in sports through issues such as gender equality, equal access, environmental concerns, concussion management, and sportswashing, among others. He concluded by urging the academic community to develop a 'theory of sport' to enhance both 'academic and social influence.'

Professor Emeritus Peter Donnelly from the University of Toronto, Canada, discussed the work of the International Committee for the Sociology of Sport [ICSS], which was established in 1964 as part of the International Council of Sport and Physical Education [UNESCO] to promote understanding between sport and society. He encouraged members to reflect on how the work of ICSS/ISSA has advanced 'peacebuilding and international understanding.' Additionally, he challenged Congress members to consider the impact of their work, even if it's just a small step forward for the children of the world.

Between Malcolm's keynote and Donnelly's commemorative address, a series of sessions and plenaries examined various current issues in sport and society. Some of the themes included: Sport, Politics, and Policy; Sport and [post] colonialism; Sport, Development, and Peace; Sport and Media; Sport and Gender [9 sessions]; Sport and Culture; Sport, Power Relations, and Social Justice; Sport Organisation and Governance; Olympism and Olympic Studies; Sport Globalisation; Mega-Events; Sport and New Technologies; Sport, Race, and Ethnicity; Sport and Culture in Korea; Sport in Asia; Sport and Disability; Sport, Environment, and Sustainability; Sport, Migration; Sport, Socialisation, and Belonging; Physical Education and School Sport; Sport and Social Class; Sport and Public Health; E-Sport and New Activities; Sport Coaching and Pedagogy; Sport and Community; Methods of Sociology of

Sport; Sport and Violence; Youth Sport; Elite Sport vs. Sport for All; and other issues related to the sociology of sport.

As I reflected, I realised that conference themes are vital for understanding the link between sport and society in the Caribbean. It is crucial for regional governments—especially ministries responsible for sports, education, health, and social development—along with national governing bodies, clubs, the media, and universities, to rise to the challenge posed by Malcolm and Connolly. They should promote the study of sport and society, develop systematic knowledge, and make a positive societal impact.

Unfortunately, the lack of commitment in governance across all levels of sport to treat it as a valuable field of study—one that can inspire action for social change, social justice, equality, and equity—will continue to limit the full potential of sports. Additionally, issues like post-truths, limited financial resources, insufficient human resource capacity at organisational levels, and challenges in implementing programs, monitoring and evaluation, coaching, and physical education further weaken governance commitment.

Besides a well-organised and smoothly run conference, it was built on a culture of social networking, camaraderie, and great hospitality from the LOC. Alongside the academic sessions, social activities included options such as attending a baseball game for sports or taking a boat cruise.

The 2026 ISSA conference will be held in Jyväskylä, Finland, from June 15-18, 2026.





GPA Awards

Since we had no physical congress in 2024, the 2024 GPA joint winners received their award at ISSA 2025 from Parissa Safai.



Well done to Eun Jung (Queen's University, Canada with a paper entitled "Constructing healthy bodies in polluted air: The illusive purity of school gyms, air quality technologies, and 'modern' South Korea") and Junbin Yang (University of Maryland, USA, with a paper entitled "Muddying the Waters of Normalized Bodies: Toward a Rhizomatic Assemblage that Matters.") It was great to see you both in person at last!



Our 2025 winner was Willian Ferraz de Santana (University of Florida, USA) with a paper entitled: "I Don't Know Where to Report What Happened": A Study on Preventing Harassment and Abuse in Cheerleading.

He received his award from Parissa Safai and Billy Graeff.

Willem told us: "*My award-winning paper is an autoethnographic account of my experience developing a reporting protocol for athletes facing harassment in cheerleading. Drawing from institutional theory and sport governance literature, the piece explores the emotional toll and ethical dilemmas of taking action in the face of institutional neglect. The work underscores the importance of listening to athletes' voices and creating systems prioritizing their safety and dignity.*"

Introducing our newest Honorary Member: Prof Steve Jackson



Award proposal – Steve Jackson as Honorary Member of ISSA

At our 2025 World Congress, we were delighted to honour Professor Steve Jackson for his sustained and outstanding contribution to the International Sociology of Sport Association and the broader socio-cultural study of sport.

Recipients of this award are in revered company to say the least.

For over 30 years, Prof Jackson (PhD, University of Illinois) has taught and researched at the University of Otago, New Zealand, and he remains one of the leading scholars in the fields of advertising, media and culture as they intersect with the sociology of sport.

With respect to research, Prof Jackson has authored four books, edited 15 others and published over 140 scholarly journal articles and book chapters. Over his career, these contributions have inspired subsequent generations of scholars to advance work on topics related to globalization, national identity, alcohol sponsorship and foreign policy. Confirming his academic status, he is a Research Fellow of the North American Society for the Sociology of Sport (NASSS) and has previously held appointments as Distinguished Research Associate/Visiting Scholar at the University of Johannesburg and Shanghai University.

But beyond these accomplishments, Prof Jackson has demonstrated sustained and outstanding leadership in the field by serving terms as General Secretary, President and Past President for the ISSA. Among the many achievements of his tenure, he introduced and led the ISSA Mentor Program in support of graduate students and scholars conducting research with English as a second language. Even after these 12 years of formal service, he continued to support the Association as an academic mentor, while also undertaking the role as lead organizer and host for the 2019 World Congress, held in Dunedin, New Zealand.

It was here that he led the establishment of the workshop for graduate students, which is still running today under his guidance and tireless involvement. We would like to emphasize the student workshop as an example of how Steve has, during all his time in ISSA, acted as a 'minister of welcoming, inclusion, acceptance and well-being' for all newcomers in our

conference – professional and social – community. This role is as hard to formally document and describe as it is important; for example, he has always, and without hesitation, sought to help people, whether by helping people find their way from the hotel to the congress venue (even offering to purchase subway tickets), and by welcoming new and emerging academics to discuss broader academic and ISSA organizational matters. In short, despite having one of the most prestigious and impressive careers of international sport sociology, Steve has always acted down to earth in a way that makes young and inexperienced scholars of sport sociology feel welcome as persons and valuable as academics.

To conclude, there is no better representative of ISSA than Professor Steven James Jackson, or ‘just Steve’ as he insists on being called. Picking up on the statutes for awarding an honorary membership in ISSA, we clearly stand for the statement that Professor Jackson has offered outstanding contributions to the *International Sociology of Sport Association* and to the sociological study of sport worldwide.

Meet Our President: Prof. Dr Annette R. Hofmann



13 - *Tales of South American Football: Passion, Revolution and Glory*


by Jorge Knijnik

Jorge Knijnik's second work of non-fiction via Fair Play Publishing is a compelling contribution to sports literature: a Brazilian-born Australian humanities academic writing about his passion-football-in his homeland and the continent it belongs to.

Exquisitely researched and written, it captures the elegance of the star players and the visceral struggles in South American societies describing the social and political context of football on the continent where *jogo bonito* is a force that both divides and unites people.

The backdrop of volatile politics, oppression and inequality in the continent is painted behind vignettes of football games, players, politicians and the sport itself.


Jorge has also written an article published in [the Globe Post](#) in which he addresses some of the issues raised in his book.



14 - *Sport, Advertising and Global Promotional Culture: Identities, Commodities, Spaces & Spectacles*

This book by **Steven J. Jackson and David L. Andrews** explores the intersection of contemporary sport, advertising, promotional culture and wider society. Arguing that advertising and promotional culture remain key driving forces in relation to social structures and systems that contribute to enduring patterns of economic and other forms of inequality, this book examines how sport and related areas of social life continue to be transformed by these forces. Presenting in-depth international case studies covering topics such as Nike's sign economies, the sports-gambling-media complex, sportswashing/greenwashing, radical politics in sport advertising, sport and corporate nationalism, and girls' empowerment and transgender exclusion in sports, this book sheds critical new light on some of the most important themes in the study of global consumer culture in the emerging era of surveillance capitalism. Overall, this book examines sport advertising through the lens of the circuit of cultural commodification – including production, representation, consumption and regulation – in order to provide insights into the formation, complexities and contradictions

of social identities, commodities and brands. The book will be useful for anyone with an interest in the sociology, culture and politics of sport, or cultural studies, media studies, and the wider politics and social significance of late-stage capitalism.



15 - *CrossFit: Commodity, Community, Contested Terrain*


This collection edited by **Marcelle C. Dawson & Steven J. Jackson** brings together the work of key scholars to explore the various dimensions, themes and controversies – the contested terrain of CrossFit – from a range of perspectives. CrossFit has emerged as a prominent fixture across the global sporting and cultural landscape. Developed initially as an exercise programme to promote functional fitness, CrossFit has undergone a rapid metamorphosis into a global, multi-dimensional, multi-million-dollar industry. Branded as ‘the sport of fitness’, it is part sport, part fitness, but also part exercise-military-regime with religious underpinnings. Perhaps best known for its unconventional approach to fitness that combines high intensity exercises with functional fitness performed in a group setting, CrossFit has surpassed the growth of well-known fitness franchises. It boasts approximately 15,000 affiliates worldwide, while, by comparison, the world’s largest gym franchise, Anytime Fitness, has around 4,500 franchises globally. Beyond its comprehensive fitness regime and global appeal, CrossFit claims to offer a supportive community, which aims to ensure that people exercise together as a group rather than as isolated individuals in a group context, or what has been referred to as ‘together alone’. The tight-knit – almost insular – nature of this community, as well as some of its more extreme practices, have led followers and detractors alike to characterise CrossFit as a cult. Yet, despite its exalted position within

the popular physical culture imaginary, critical scholarly analysis of CrossFit has only recently emerged.



16 - *The Contested Terrain of Sport: Sociological, Political and Policy Perspectives*


This anthology edited by **Steven J. Jackson and Michael P. Sam** brings together a set of 10 critical analyses of the intersection of sociology, politics, and policy within the contested terrain of sport. The concept of contested terrain is used to capture the uniqueness and complexity of sport as a site for discussion, debate, negotiation, and conflict involving diverse interest groups with varying levels of resources and contrasting, competing sets of ideas and beliefs. Given its global presence and strategic location alongside key state sectors, including health, education, culture, business, and foreign policy, 'sport' is increasingly the focus of serious discussion amongst scholars, policy makers, and citizens. This anthology showcases research that spans a range of topics from sport mega-events and sportswashing to sport integrity, wellbeing, and inclusion. Furthermore, the collection explores these topics from a diverse set of social contexts, academic disciplines, and theoretical and methodological frameworks.



17 - *Rings of Dissent: Performances of Rebellion in Boxing*

Due out in December 2025


Professional boxers practice their trade within an ostensibly apolitical arena. In reality, however, the fighters work inside a capitalistic and neoliberal sports culture that they both challenge and uphold. This collection, edited by **Rudy Mondragón, Gaye Theresa Johnson, and David J. Leonard**, delves into professional boxing's capacity for brilliance, contradiction, resistance, and complicity. Scholars, activists, and artists explore the boxing ring as a site for understanding original and diverse ideas about the performance of race, citizenship, gender, power, and dissent. Essays and interviews draw attention to the cultural politics and performances of marginalized boxers while revealing the structures of power and practices of agency at work around Black, Brown, and queer bodies. As the contributors establish boxing's central place in communities of color, they open exciting new avenues for studying race, immigration, gender, and capital. Multifaceted and innovative, *Rings of Dissent* uncovers fascinating corners of the boxing world as it illuminates what the sport tells us about America.



18 - *Violent Impacts: How Power and Inequality Shape the Concussion Crisis*


Concerns regarding brain injury in sport have escalated into what is often termed a “concussion crisis,” fueled by high-profile lawsuits and deaths. Although athletes are central figures in this narrative, they comprise only a small proportion of the people who experience brain injuries, while other high-risk groups—including victims of domestic violence and police brutality—are all too often left out of the story. In *Violent Impacts*, **Kathryn Henne and Matt Ventresca** examine what is and what isn’t captured in popular discourse, scrutinizing how law, science, and social inequalities shape depictions and understandings of brain injury. Drawing on research carried out in Australia, Canada, and the United States, they illustrate how structural violence centers certain bodies as part of the concussion crisis while pushing others to the margins.



19 - *Olympic Opening Ceremonies: Memory and Modernity*

This is the first book to unpack the history and significance of the opening ceremony of the Olympic Games, the frontispiece of the most watched event on Earth.

Covering the period from the Moscow Olympics in 1980 to Tokyo 2020, the book by **Daniel Malanski** examines when, how and why the Olympic opening ceremonies' artistic programme became the multi-act spectacles seen today. It argues that the embedded nationalistic, ethnic and environmental discourses contained in opening ceremonies have much to tell us about national narratives, memory and myth-making, about the history of representation, and about how the Olympics and the spectacle of mega-events are prisms through which local and global socio-political issues are refracted, from the climate crisis and the struggle for minority rights to the emergence of a multi-polar world.



A new 'release' (aka edition) of *Sports in Society: Issues and Controversies*, by **Jay Coakley and Jeff Montez de Oca**, is now available. This edition continues to provide a detailed introduction to the sociology of sport. It uses sociological concepts, theories, and research to raise critical questions about sports and explore the dynamic relationship between sports, culture, and society. It takes an issues-oriented approach to the study of sports in society and encourages the discussion of current sports-related controversies. Chapter content is presented so that readers can engage in critical thinking as they consider their personal experiences, families, schools, communities, and societies. For over 40 years, *Sports in Society* has been a resource in the cultural, interactional, and structural dimensions of sports. The 2025 edition provides a thorough introduction to the sociology of sport by raising critical questions to explore the relationships between sports, culture, and society. This text takes an issues-oriented approach to the study of sports in society and encourages discussion of current sports-related controversies. Students develop critical thinking skills as they consider various sport forms in their personal experiences, families, schools, communities, and societies.

To accompany the 2025 edition of *Sports in Society*, Jay and Jeff have created a podcast series with over 30 episodes. Each episode focuses on one or more key topics in a chapter of the text. In some episodes, Jay and Jeff host guest experts and discuss emerging issues that are widely publicized and often contentious. 
